Police Reform: The 20/20 vision

Policing has changed considerably since 1829 when Rowan and Mayne constructed their model for a professional Service. Although things have moved dramatically forward, questions have been raised about the future challenges police forces are likely to face, and whether there will be a requirement for a more integrated operating platform.

This important conference will be an opportunity to explore whether and how reform is necessary or inevitable in order for the service to respond more dynamically to these challenges, and whether the cherished concept of locally based policing by consent in the UK can be preserved for future generations.
